# **SIGN Surgery Transforms Lives**

#### Nestor Mpawenimana, 17 Ngozi Hospital, Burundi

Nestor is an orphan, and he uses income from his bike taxi to pay for his high school education. In August, he was riding home from the market when he was struck by a car, causing a tibia fracture.

"I am very happy because I thought that my life was over, and now I have regained my smile. I ask donors to extend the program to other hospitals in the country so that other patients and victims of various accidents can benefit from it."



#### Luka Aprerihono, 35 St. Joseph's Hospital Kitgum, Uganda

Luka lives in Chukudum, South Sudan, near the border with Uganda. He is a farmer, supporting his wife and three children. His vehicle was ambushed, and he was shot in the leg, breaking his femur. The local hospital provided initial care, but they were not equipped for

orthopaedic surgery. He was referred to another hospital, but with the ongoing violence, there was no safe transport available. He was bedridden for three weeks before he found a cargo truck that could bring him to St. Joseph's Hospital Kitgum a bumpy three-hour drive.

The next day, surgeons at St. Joseph's used a SIGN Fin Nail to stabilize the fracture. One month after surgery, his recovery is going well, and he is nearly ready to resume farming.

"My life has been restored, I couldn't imagine I would walk again and I am very happy now," Luka says. "I sincerely thanked SIGN program for providing free implants and the surgeon for the good work done."

## **Johnson Flomo, 17**

John F. Kennedy Medical Center (JFK), **Liberia** 

John was riding in the back of a taxi that crashed into a presidential motorcade. Initially, his family wanted to take him to a traditional bonesetter, but doctors at JFK convinced them that a SIGN Implant was the best treatment, and would enable him to walk sooner.

He has fully recovered, and is now back to work laying floor tiles at a construction site, which is an important source of support for his family.

"When I had the accident, I thought I would not be able to walk again. My family was devastated because I am a major source of support for them. However, the SIGN Team at JFK did extremely well and gave me hope. Less than four months after the accident, I am able to walk normally and I am very happy to be back to work. I extend my thanks and appreciation to the SIGN Team for performing this miracle. I will forever be grateful."

#### **U San Hlaing, 74** Myanmar Traveling Set, **Myanmar**

When San fell and fractured his left femur near the hip, his family brought him from a small village to the city of Tharrawaddy. Local doctors wanted to transfer him to the capital city for surgery, but he could not afford the travel and cost of being away from his family.

With the Myanmar Traveling Set, surgeons from Yangon traveled to Tharrawaddy Hospital and partnered with local doctors to stabilize

his fracture with a SIGN Nail and FX Plate. San and his family were grateful that the surgery could be performed locally.
