

## **SIGN Patient:**

Mary Ikoli, South Sudan

Two years ago, Mary Ikoli came to Juba Teaching Hospital in Juba, South Sudan, with two broken legs. The 26-year-old mother of two was seven months pregnant. She lives in Torit, a rural community in South Sudan that has faced food insecurity, bordering on famine, since 2017.

She had climbed a tree to pick leaves and cook them for her family. She fell and broke both femurs, which left her totally incapacitated.

Her family's already difficult situation had become much worse. Four days after her injury, she was brought to Juba Teaching Hospital, where Dr. Mapuor Mading was able to stabilize both of her legs. Dr. Mapuor used SIGN Fin Nails to perform the surgery in less than 30 minutes,

which reduced the chance of complications with Mary's pregnancy.

"I didn't know that I would ever walk again," Mary says. "I thought the child in my womb would have a mother that could not walk."

Just 10 days after surgery, Mary was walking and doctors at Juba Teaching Hospital assured her that her pregnancy was progressing well. She returned home to Torit, where she gave birth to a baby boy.

Mary was not able to return to Juba for two years, but when she came for a follow-up visit, she walked into the hospital carrying her 16-month-old. Her x-rays show full healing, and she reports no lasting effects from her broken legs.

"You see I can walk and run now, carrying my baby," Mary says. "Thank you all for helping me."

## SIGN Patient: Ridwan Ahmed, Somaliland

Ridwan Ahmed, 23, is a police driver in Somaliland. He is married with two daughters. In July, he was hit by a criminal with a big stone while he was in the line of duty. The following day he was transferred to Hargeisa Group Hospital where he received care and we were able to fix his fractures with a standard SIGN Nail. Luckily there were no complications with the surgery and afterward.

I worked with Dr. Ridwan Mohamed on this case, and we chose to use a SIGN Implant for the fact that it eases early mobilization with less bed stay. The patient was fortunate, as are many who have SIGN Implants, and walked out of his bed the day of his surgery.

Ridwan is currently back to work—in the police station and driving—and is amazed by the job done for his injured leg. He is pain-free and can bend his knee like any other normal person, which is telling us that his range of motion is fully restored.

"God healed me, I am standing on my broken leg," Ridwan says. "I have been using it the last two weeks. I am happy because I can stand on it and flex it. Nothing is neglected in my life now."

Dr. Mohamed completed his medical degree at the University of Hargeisa and has stayed on at Hargeisa Group Hospital to learn from the orthopaedic department. I am thrilled that the names of the father and doctor are almost identical, Ridwan Ahmed and Dr. Ridwan Mohamed, and that they are both married with two kids and both serving their nation through public service.

"To become a good orthopaedic surgeon is my core dream at this moment," says Dr. Mohamed. "Thanks to my mentor and SIGN Team, who have helped me to shape my skills in this amazing field of orthopaedics. My sincere gratitude goes to Dr. Abdirashid a senior and mentor, without him I couldn't have the ability to operate this case or any other patient in the first place."




